Message From Superintendent Rhonda Dean

This is an exciting time for Rockford Area Schools. Over the past 18 months, the school board and the administrative team have engaged in a strategic planning process that included collecting data from staff, students and parents. As a result of our efforts, at the March 2021 school board meeting, the school board approved a revised mission, vision and strategic direction. The strategic plan will guide our efforts to ensure we provide a robust quality educational experience for all our students.

Rockford Area Schools has leaned into the challenge of providing a quality educational experience for students while mitigating the effects of COVID-19 in our schools. As a result, we are pleased to report that last year, our elementary school remained fully open to in-person instruction five days a week, with the exception of six Fridays. During those six Fridays, our youngest learners practiced distance learning from home. Our secondary schools, the middle school and high school, operated under an AA/BB hybrid model during the first semester; and transitioned to in-person instruction four days a week in the second semester. We are proud of the Rockford community for their efforts in helping maintain the "Rockford bubble." It's through our collective efforts that Rockford Area Schools has continued to provide quality instruction.

Among the many things that the pandemic has revealed is the importance of skilled trade workers. Fortunately, Rockford Area School has positioned itself to meet this growing need. During the pandemic, Rockford High School was authorized as an International Baccalaureate (IB) World school offering both the IB Diploma program and the IB Career Pathway program. It's the IB Career pathway program that focuses on skilled trade workers. Over the next several years, we will be expanding opportunities for students to gain the knowledge and skills to enter the workforce. This is an opportunity to partner with local businesses to expose students to different vocational options. We are excited about the future of Rockford Area Schools and look forward to expanding our educational programs.

Stronger Internet Services Could Mean Additional Funds

Broadband (internet) services are getting a fresh look in our school district. Hennepin and Wright Counties are in the process of studying the delivery and signal strength of public and private broadband services within our communities, and these results should allocate additional funds to improve the local infrastructure to families and businesses within our school district.

Each county has recently allocated up to \$10 million from federal funding to address the issue of improving broadband disparities in access to the internet and support for digital literacy. Phil Essington is the Director of Broadband and Digital Inclusion for Hennepin County and Elizabeth Karels is a Project Manager from Wright County who are leading their county's efforts for improvement. Our District Technology Director has been in discussion with both of them to help focus resources in our community to help improve digital inclusion and equity.

The Minnesota Department of Education recently requested the school district conduct a survey of all families with children in our schools regarding access to broadband services and the digital issues our community faces. The district has included this survey in our new online registration program. The new online enrollment program will be used to update student enrollments and annual forms through our Infinite Campus Parent Portal program. The Minnesota Department of Education asks each household to complete the survey.

A general mapping of the survey results will be shared with Wright and Hennepin Counties to help them locate areas within our community needing additional resources.

Rockford Area Schools is committed to helping families improve their digital inclusion and literacy. The district has adopted a one-to-one digital device program to provide students with the ability to connect and learn. Each K-12 student in our school district has an assigned Chromebook and teachers have placed much of their teaching resources online to support teaching and learning on and off campus.

The district has also provided internet "hot spots" to many families that reside in areas where digital resources are not fully available to meet the needs of remote learning. Last month, our school district applied for a federal emergency connectivity fund grant with the intent to continue our efforts in providing these digital learning services to our community and continue our support of digital inclusion and equity.

Rockford Area Schools Receives AAA Rating On The Minnesota School District Credit Enhancement Program

Our MN Rating Call was conducted over the phone with Standard & Poor's (S&P) in Chicago, IL on September 22, 2021, regarding our General Obligation School building refunding bond series 2021B. We received **S&P "AAA"**Minnesota School District Credit Enhancement Program Rating and S&P underlying rating "AA-" (Stable Outlook).

This is an upgrade from our previous S&P "A+" bond rating in 2015 for our school district. This is the result of strong financial management of the District and it will help to achieve better bond refinance rates based on our current investment market conditions.





Safe Routes to Schools Update

With the SRTS Plan in place, it's time to shift attention to implementation and a progress update for the various projects in the planning/funding/execution stage for 2021-2023.

Maple Street Crossing and Highway 55, Highest Priority

A Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacon (RRFB) has been planned, funded, and approved for installation at the Maple Street and Highway 55 crossing before the end of 2021.

CR 50/Rebecca Park Trail Road Improvement Project

The project scheduled for construction in 2023 will begin at Cut Off Trail and end 600 feet east of Dogwood Street with goals to eliminate the bypass lanes and replace them with left/right turn lanes. Additionally, install median/refuge islands at Kola Street and Sterling Drive crossings, add curb extensions, install enhanced pedestrian crossing signs, and add a potential RRFB.

CR50/Rebecca Park Trail Curbed Connector from Bridge Street to Cut Off Trail

The MnDot/SRTS grant solicitation cycle ending in December could fund the addition of a curbed multi-use 8-10 feet wide connecter trail for proposed construction by 2023.

The SRTS team is working on other key initiatives such as implementing an Adult Crossing Guard program, Walk! Bike! Fun! Curriculum, and the potential of adding a wide paved path behind RMS leading to the crossing at CR33/Elm Street connecting to Mutterrer Park/Elmwood Trail.

Hi Rockford Area Schools community, I hope you find this information about me interesting and informative. I grew up and did some farming in the Rockford area. I started my custodial career as a third shift custodian and a facilities supervisor at two large metro districts before coming to Rockford as the Director of Building and Grounds. With more than 26 years of work experience in K-12 facilities, I can say one thing for sure, Rockford Area Schools (RAS) is the best school district I have worked in. The custodial/maintenance staff at RAS are the best people I have worked with. I love working for a great organization.

I want to share some statistics on the work our custodians and maintenance staff do every day.

We maintain:

- 140.76 acres
- 2.75 miles of sidewalks to make and keep safe
- 475,000 sq. ft. of facilities
- 3 educational buildings, 1 bus garage, 1 greenhouse, 5 outbuildings
- On average, each custodian is responsible for cleaning 35,000-47,000 sq. ft. each night
- 17 sports fields
- 8 hot water boilers to operate

This is just a small portion of what an amazing custodial/maintenance staff performs daily.

Arts Opportunities Return to REAMS

Rockford Elementary Arts Magnet School, a member of the Northwest Suburban Integration School District, is celebrating its eighteenth year as an arts magnet school for students in kindergarten through grade four. Students are provided with learning adventures that take them beyond the traditional instructional classroom experience. Teaching through the arts helps students experience concepts rather than merely discussing or reading about them. Teachers focus on a strong academic core with opportunities for creative expression, critical thinking, self-confidence, communication skills, appreciation of the arts, and multicultural experiences for students. These concepts are promoting skills for students that assist them in academic as well as life success.

Students at Rockford Elementary Arts Magnet School spent the 2020-2021 school year in school the entire year but had put many arts experience opportunities on hold because of the pandemic. REAMS is excited that these arts opportunities for students will be back this year.

Artist in Residence experiences will take place for all students in grades K-4. The Rockford Elementary Arts Magnet School staff is excited to partner with many local artists who provide experiences for students at REAMS in the areas of dance, drama, music, visual arts, and diversity. Children have the opportunity to work with many of the artists for one or more sessions and often couple their learning with a connected field trip. The teachers have also related the work with the artists to the core curriculum back in their classrooms to enhance the students learning.

In addition to artist-in-residence experiences, students will once again participate in the spotlight on the arts concerts at each grade level. Spotlight concerts give students performance experiences that foster creativity and boost confidence. Concerts are connected to the core curriculum and enhance student learning.

Lastly, a major arts related experience that will be returning for REAMS students will be Fabulous Friday celebrations. Students come together once a month in an assembly to share their work. Students of all grade levels share their learning and their talents in a performance-based atmosphere. Fabulous Friday is an assembly where students can share a wide variety of learning in a non-threatening environment. Students begin the assembly with the school song and end with the school kindness song.

As an Arts Magnet School that gives students opportunities in creativity and confidence building, the staff at REAMS is excited to bring so many of these learning experience back to the students during the 2021-2022 school year.

REAMS Sends Kind Messages

On Monday, Oct 4, students at REAMS did their part to spread joy and kick-off National Bullying Awareness Month (October) by "chalking" cement spaces around the elementary school. Armed with pieces of chalk, students decorated the sidewalks with messages celebrating kindness, love, Rocket Pride, and acceptance. "The relationships we build in school can have lasting, lifetime implications for better or for worse," said Michael Rask, new counselor at REAMS and organizer of the Kindness in Chalk initiative. "Sometimes all someone needs to hear or see are kind, positive words to remind them that they are cared for and they have a village of

people to support them. At an elementary level, an event like Kindness in Chalk enhances positivity and helps kids feel good about themselves and gives them a greater sense of belonging."

Reading Interventions Succeed at REAMS

Title One and Alternative Delivery of Specialized Instructional Services (ADSIS) are part of the REAMS general education support program. A goal at REAMS is to provide extra reading help and instruction to students who are struggling with reading. The reading instruction is specialized and reinforces and supplements reading work done in the classroom.

It is a goal that reading intervention and providing reading assistance at a primary level will result in more rapid results and a greater success rate for students. Reading intervention at REAMS happens during a student's WIN (What I need) time and does not take students out of the core reading and math lessons of the day. Title One and ADSIS participants meet in a small group (2-4 students), 5 times weekly for approximately 30 minute sessions.



Children will work on phonemic awareness, phonics, decoding words, fluency, vocabulary, and writing. There are two Title One and ADSIS teachers at REAMS who foster an enjoyment of books and encourage students to read as a leisure activity. The teachers also hope by providing reading success, our teachers are able to aid students in developing a positive attitude and greater self-confidence.

Arts Troupes Goes Beyond Traditional Curriculum

Fourth grade students have an exciting opportunity to participate in one or more Arts Troupes during their final year at REAMS. These specialized classes of presentation or performance groups are in the arts areas of visual art, dance, music, or theater. By offering in-depth fine arts experiences, students have an opportunity to go beyond the traditional elementary arts curriculum in a smaller setting with more hands-on training.

For example, fourth grade students have an option of working with Mrs. Weber in the visual art studio creating a year-long project that will be added to the REAMS permanent gallery. Another option this fall has been 4th Grade Choir, working with Ms. Larson and Mr. Eliason. Students in the choir arts troupe learn to use their voice properly for singing and to learn to sing a wide variety of songs in several music styles. The culmination of Fourth Grade Choir arts troupe is singing at the annual District Choral Festival concert with all of the middle school and high school choirs in the district.

A few other arts troupes offered this year include Intro to dance classes, Intro to Theater Games, Reader's Theater (putting on a short play), Gullah Stick Pounding and World Drumming, to name just a few.

Link Crew Helps Make Connections At The High School

Link Crew (Link), now in its fifteenth year at Rockford High School, continues to grow stronger. The Link Leaders have done a fantastic job this fall reaching out to 9th grade students and aiding with their transition into high school.

Link Crew is a program that was created by The Boomerang Project, an organization dedicated to creating programs that allow schools to better teach students as they develop relationships and strengthen ties within the school. As the founders put it:

"The Link Crew program provides a structure which guides freshmen toward both academic and social success. Link Crew helps create an environment where freshmen learn that people at school care about them and their future by [creating] ... support, connection and a sense of comfort and belonging."

Link Leaders must be available each August for 10 hours of training. Training helps build a network of like-minded student leaders who can support each other as they assist with problem solving, community building, and program development. The training also helps show Leaders the activities they will lead the first day but it also provides experience in the skills they will need to lead freshmen all year long.

In 2020, the Link program was entirely virtual. Because of the importance of 9th grade orientation, an entirely new process was implemented via Google Meets. This year distancing and smaller groupings were brought back to life. The first day of school is launch day for 9th graders. Students spend several hours engaging in activities designed to find common ground and deliver important messages about success in High School.

Over the last fifteen years, Rockford High School teachers have seen the benefits Link Leaders can have in the classroom. Leaders, having worked independently to lead small groups of 9th graders, are able to see the effort and time it takes to develop effective lessons and relationships with students. They are more empathetic, more eager to participate, and more engaged members of the classroom. Link impacts 9th graders by making them more comfortable with asking questions, with process and procedures, in engaging in friendships with upperclassmen, and in creating a support system that freshmen go back to time and time again.

In the past, Link has been able to play host to a regional Link Student Conference. This conference, led by Boomerang Project speaker Harriet Turk, emphasized the idea that these Leaders are not just Leaders to their Crew of 9th grade students, but also a part of a larger program that works to develop leaders and improve school cultures across the country (and the world). While the ongoing challenges of the pandemic will limit the opportunities we have to do such Conferences this year, we know that these messages remain true. We are all connected.


Rockford Community Center Offers Programs For All Ages
