Native American Committee comes to RAS

With guidance from the Minnesota Department of Education's American Indian Education department, the Rockford Area School district recently formed a Native American Parent Action Committee (NAPAC) committee. This year the committee elected chairwomen Elizabeth Blackhawk and Lesa Jackson, created a budget, planned for meetings with Native American students at all three schools, and organized the allocation of resources.

The committee also conducted a needs assessment to garner feedback from teachers who are responsible for creating curriculum around numerous Native American-related Minnesota state standards. Teachers analyzed resources and were excited to support student learning through books (fiction and non-fiction), artwork, lacrosse equipment, and other curricular supports.

Kindness Council makes a front row seat

Every year, teachers at REAMS nominate 3rd and 4th grade students to be on the "Kindness Council" with the school counselor. The students serve as role models for other students. The purpose of the council is to provide a leadership experience for students who exemplify kindness to others.

Each year, the group focuses on a variety of projects that spread kindness in school. Some past projects include: kind notes to teachers, janitors, and bus drivers, picking up garbage around the school, and creating kind posters. This year the council had an extra special project; a Buddy Bench.

The purpose of a Buddy Bench is to help kids feel more included and connected at school and with each other. A child sitting on the Buddy Bench indicates to his or her peers that he/she would like a buddy. Whether a child is feeling overwhelmed, shy or just having an off day, sitting on the bench means he/she would like someone to talk to or play with. The special bench will promote more acceptance and inclusion during recess.

The council painted a variety of colorful designs on the bench and it was installed at the end of the school year on the school's playground.



Continuous line art makes a connection

Fourth grade students have a unique opportunity to participate in a Visual Arts Troupe in addition to their weekly scheduled Art class. This year, Art Troupe students examined artwork by artists who used continuous contour line in their work.

Continuous contour line is a drawing technique used to focus on the main lines and outline of the subject. This technique is done by keeping your drawing utensil on the paper until the drawing is complete. The goal is to focus on the subject you are drawing and to occasionally look at your paper while completing the work.

Students wanted to make the overall shape interesting and have the entire drawing connect and continue throughout the work. This inspired the idea of multiple triangular canvases. The piece is a part of the REAMS Permanent Art Collection.

Learning through the Arts with Artist in Residencies

This spring, each grade level at REAMS showcased their talents while working with and learning from an artist who worked with each class. Students in kindergarten and first grade worked with dance artist Karla Nweje to create movements representing the life cycle of the plant (kindergarten) and the life cycle of a frog (first grade).

Second and third grade students created animal puppets and masks with visual artist and story teller, Julie Boada. Based on Native American stories, students were able to create their masterpieces using papier-mâché techniques and perform the stories as a class.

Fourth grade students worked with dance artist Leah Nelson in a Distance Learning Dance experience. The final in-person session included a recording of the dance, for those who wanted to show off their talents. The students used a Zulu Gospel song that has taken the world by storm called Jerusalema! Students brought their unique and diverse positive ideas of what they believe through movement.



First grade cycle of life



In first-grade students learned about the life cycles of plants and animals birds, chickens, frogs, butterflies, pumpkins, plants and trees.

Students engaged in science, art and writing activities that expand their knowledge and spark their curiosities. Students also learn about animal habitats and the different environments where these cool creatures live. They explored the Arctic, Rainforests, Prairies, Grasslands, Savannas, and Deserts and were able to compare and contrast what makes each habitat unique and different.

Third grade engineers



Readers, mathematicians, scientists, critical thinkers, and now ENGINEERS describe third graders at REAMS.

This year the kids had a chance to become engineers through a partnership with, The Works.

Students learned about light and simple machines

then built kaleidoscopes and catapults. Not only did these activities build scientific knowledge about how the world works but they also taught students how to use and apply an engineering design processes. Each student planned, tested, altered and built their own unique kaleidoscope and catapult. It was a crazy, yet fun way to learn an important way of thinking!

Mission to be accomplished

In the tenth year as an environmental STEM school, RMS-CES staff is clarifying its mission. Over a series of discussions. staff learned from their colleagues, explored outdoor spaces, and redefined what it means to teach and learn in an environmentally focused STEM school.



The first workshops featured Jan Hendrickson teaching poe-tree in the school forest, Sarah Genderson leading a session on creating paint brushes from outdoor materials, and Jamie Madson exploring outdoor spaces through digital photography.

The training wrapped up with a discussion on what it means to be an RMS-CES environmental STEM student from a teacher perspective, student perspective and parent perspective. As stated by one RMS-CES staff member, "A STEM student is a future agent of change. They know and can explain their impact on the natural world as a member of our school, and the larger community."

RMS-CES staff looks forward to exploring and clarifying the RMS-CES mission.

Personal creeds and FFA



All seventh-grade students take an Agri-Science class that focuses on different aspects of agriculture including companion animals, sustainability, agriculture literacy and the Future Farmers of America (FFA) Creed. FFA is an agriculture-based student organization that helps students with career success, personal growth, and premier leadership.

The FFA Creed was written in 1928, and adopted by the FFA in 1930. The creed has been used as a pillar of the organization.

At the end of the quarter, students analyze, recite, and interpret the FFA Creed collaboratively with their classmates. Together student's wrote personal creeds that focused on their values, some being tangible and others not. The projects were "pizzas" topped with ingredients that represented their unique values based on family, experiences and interests. The masterpieces were displayed in pizza boxes.

Perseverance in 7th and 8th grade choir

Choir had a tough year, but students persevered. Singing in a mask is hard, as it can suck to your face when you take a good breath for singing, and it muffles your sound. But our students are resilient! They gained skills in sight reading brand new music (pictured), more advanced music vocabulary, and reading a choir score. Greenhouse continues growing

While the greenhouse on the RMS-CES campus was built in 2021, it has actually been in the works for much longer. About six years ago, our school became a top ten finalist in a grant program through Seeds of Change. After many, many votes from our school and greater community, RMS-CES was awarded a \$20,000 greenhouse grant. Other funds were also raised from community partners including the Rockford Education Foundation.

The new greenhouse will be used for a multitude of academic projects connecting to various courses taught at RMS-CES. However, the overall goal with this new addition is to continue shaping students into critical thinkers and problem solvers, and to bring awareness to topics such as alternative methods to grow and care for food.

Meaningful learning experiences happen because students are given opportunities to be hands-on, minds-on learners. Fortunately, the greenhouse can help to create those important experiences for the students of Rockford.



Archery lesson hits the bullseye



Through a grant, the Phy Ed program was able to purchase five archery targets, bows, arrows, an indoor backdrop net and a repair kit. Archery has proven to be one of the more successful, fun and safe units.

Archery is an activity where all students can participate. Students are introduced to the basic rules and safety of handling a bow and arrow and have a chance to practice their shots. The lesson provides life-long skills of discipline and self-control, while having fun.

Many hands feed many people

This spring, 36 students and staff from RMS-CES gathered in the lunchroom with a goal of making a difference for those in need. The middle school FFA Chapter partnered with Kids Against Hunger to pack meals to be sent to Lebanon. Each person had an important task. Tasks included holding bags, adding rice, soy, protein or veggies, and the weighing and sealing just before each box was packed and taped. With open hearts, happy smiles, and many hands, four lines of people packed over 200 boxes of rice based meals.


